This year 50 juniors from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick played in the **Nova Scotia Junior Open Squash 2024 Tournament** up from 36 last year, held Nov. 15-16 at **SMUfit**'s squash courts in Halifax.

"Growth of the sport is the reason we hold these tournaments," **Josh Rudolph**, Provincial Squash Coach and Tournament Director, told **In The Nick**. "Tournaments bring together the camaraderie and build friendships."

Rudolph said junior tournaments are important for the development of the sport.

It is a dramatic turn around for the junior squash scene. Last year the tournament was held for the first time since the COVID 19 pandemic cancelled tournaments.

It indicates juniors are returning or entering the sport which will be included for the first time in the summer Olympics in 2028 in Los Angeles, said Rudolph.

The Junior Mixed 1 Division winner was **Garreth Beckles** who won the title in three straight matches, only dropping two games. And this was his last N.S. Junior Open Tournament as he turns 19 in January 2025.

Beckles was the Team Captain for the 2023 Nova Scotia Canada Games Squash Team.

The Junior Mixed 2 Division was won by Kayin Burrell.

Two brothers battled it out for the Junior Mixed 3 Division in the final match. **Zakareeah Hussein** came back from a two game deficit to beat his brother, **Hamza Hussein**, winning in five games.

**Arreyah Carvery** won the Mixed 4 Division, in a very close final match against **Violet Palmer**, winning in five games. In the Junior Mixed 5 Division there were eight players and competition was fierce with **Rui Yu** taking the title of 1st Place.

**Henry Quach** won the title for Junior Mixed 6 Division in three straight matches, never dropping a game.

**Leo Guilderson** deserves a shout out. This was the 12-year-old's second N.S. Junior Open Squash Tournament, and his third career tournament, and won his first two matches ever, finishing 2nd of 4 in a tough mixed junior division.

In the non-competitive Novice Division, six-year-old **Ella Pelton** won her first squash medal.


**Dalhousie Squash Club** (DSC) kicked off the school year with an Introduction to Squash Tournament.

### **Dealing With Player Dissent - Recent World Squash Organization Directives**

Recently, the **World Squash Officiating** (WSO) has issued a few directives which seek to clarify referees' implementation of some of the rules. With Squash's upcoming debut at the Olympics, as well as a desire to bring squash to mainstream television, the intent is to make squash more viewer-friendly by reducing a few controversial behaviours which have caused some concern in the recent past, and also clarifying understanding of a few key areas.

The directives gained attention when a clip of a recent **Professional Squash Association** (PSA) match was posted, in which one of the players was penalized by "conduct match", for trying to influence the referee's decision. The clip did not show what led up to the decision, nor the context of the preceding WSO directives which had jointly been agreed to by the WSO and the PSA players.

Each month our local **Black Shirt Ref Crew** responds to questions from the readership about rules, specific situations, and officiating decisions in general.

Through this column, players will build knowledge into both their games and their own officiating skills.

Below are a few highlights of the directives which address "player dissent" and how it is now being handled at the PSA level. While dissent is not typically such an issue at the recreational level, the information below is provided to raise awareness.

Directives related to Player Dissent:

It is important to understand that players trying to influence referee decisions by creating or exaggerating improper movement(s) and/or interference, thus causing too many interruptions and stoppages in the game, will not be tolerated.

Nor should players be shouting decisions or making comments to influence the referee prior to them awarding a decision. Referees have been instructed to use the Code of Conduct for this type of influencing behaviour.

Players can ask for explanations from referees to understand actions better, but explanations should not be required for every decision. Providing an explanation, after giving their decision, is at the discretion of the referee, and that must be accepted without further discussion.

Player dissent is distinct from requesting an explanation for a decision. Dissent occurs when a player expresses disagreement or objection to a referee's decision through behaviours such as repeated questioning, using an aggressive tone, arguing, shouting, or making disrespectful comments, gestures, expressions, or head-shakes, audibly and/or visibly challenging the referee's authority or competency at any time before, during or after a match or tournament. This includes attempting to sway, vary or change the outcome of the referee's decision.

This behaviour will result in code of conduct consequences based on the severity. Players must accept the decisions and explanations given by the Referee without engaging in further

discussion. Referees are being instructed to clamp down on this area due to an increase in continued and extended discussions during matches.

The links below provide access to the full directives published to date, which also include topics related to: speed of play, time wasting, foot faults, safety (notably eyewear for juniors), fair play, proper player movement and clearing, coaching, court etiquette, verbal or physical abuse, interference, injury, blocking and code of conduct.

Also included is a link to an interview with WSO/PSA representatives, explaining the context of the match in question and an interview with **Lee Drew**, WSO Officiating.
